## **Independent Auditor's Report**

#### To the shareholders of Avaya Denmark ApS

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Avaya Denmark ApS for the financial year 1 October 2017 - 30 September 2018, which comprise an income statement, balance sheet, notes and a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company at 30 September 2018 and of the results of the Company operations for the financial year 1 October 2017 - 30 September 2018 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

#### **Basis of opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. ## **Management's Review**

#### The Company's principal activities

Avaya is a leading global provider of next-generation business collaboration and communications solutions, providing unified communications, real-time video collaboration, contact center, and related services to companies of all sizes around the world.

Enterprises of all sizes depend on Avaya for state-of-the-art communications that improve efficiency, collaboration, customer service and competitiveness. Avaya works mainly in Education, Financial Services, Healthcare, State and Local Government, and Hospitality industry verticals.

Avaya in the Nordics predominantly works through channel partners. The main partners in the region are Westcon (distributor), TDC / NetDesign and Jansson (Denmark), Tele2 (Sweden), Telia/Cygate (Sweden), NetNordic (acquired IPnett) and Atea (Norway).

#### **Development in activities and financial matters**

The Company's Income Statement of the financial year 1 October 2017 - 30 September 2018 shows a result of DKK 621.417 and the Balance Sheet at 30 September 2018 a balance sheet total of DKK 27.014.098 and an equity of DKK 12.630.087.

Avaya continues to focus on innovation, openness and integration. Avaya is one of the leaders in the Contact Center and Unified Communications market and is an important player in the Cloud infrastructure market space with products that outperform well established competitors. There has been a significant focus on virtualization and cloud solutions which fits well into the Avaya strategy and roadmap.

The parent entity Avaya Inc. filed a voluntary petition in January 2017 under Chapter 11 of the US Bankruptcy Code with the objective to restructure its Balance Sheet. Avaya continued normal operations and the Nordic entities were not directly impacted. Avaya successfully emerged from Chapter 11 on 15 December 2017.

On 7 March 2017, Extreme Networks Inc. agreed to acquire from Avaya Inc. certain assets and liabilities related to Avaya's Networking business globally for approximately USD 100 million. The global Asset Purchase Agreement was executed by both parties at that date. The transaction was closed on the 14 July 2017, with the signing of the global Closing Agreement. This agreement identified certain entities that closed on 14 July 2017 and certain entities that were local 'Deferred Closing' entities. Avaya Denmark ApS had a deferred closing date until 31st March 2018. The sale in Avaya Denmark ApS related to inventory and maintenance revenue contracts. It continued its reseller and market support activities relating to the Networking business until 31st March 2018, the deferred closing date.

The Regional Headcount is expected to remain flat year over year.

## Post financial year events

After the end of the financial year, no events have occurred which may change the financial position of the entity substantially.

#### **Ownership**

The Company is a fully owned subsidiary of Avaya International Enterprises Ltd.

## **Management's Review**

#### **Expectations for the future**

Avaya continues to operate in a highly competitive business environment with ongoing consolidation of communications vendors and customers. Enterprises are focusing on building an efficient and open communication infrastructure to support the business by enhancing communication and customer service while reducing costs. Industry growth in 2017 was driven primarily by up selling and upgrading the installed base and by selling new infrastructure and collaboration solutions.

Avaya is positioned for growth with strong offerings in the rapidly expanding areas of Contact Center solutions, enterprise mobility, collaboration and cloud offers in midmarket and enterprise marked. Avaya continues to invest in innovation to meet the demands of customers today and into the future. R&D investment is above the industry average, as we work closely with our customers and partners to shape the future of collaboration.

## **Accounting Policies**

#### **Reporting Class**

The Annual Report of Avaya Denmark ApS for 2017/2018 has been presented in accordance with the provisions of the Danish Financial Statements Act applying to enterprises of reporting class B.

The accounting policies applied remain unchanged from last year.

#### Reporting currency

The Annual Report is presented in Danish kroner.

#### **Translation policies**

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into DKK at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into DKK based on the exchange rates prevailing at the balance sheet day. Realised and unrealised foreign exchange gains and losses are included in the Income Statement under Financial Income and Expenses.

## **General Information**

#### Basis of recognition and measurement

Income is recognised in the Income Statement as it is earned, including value adjustments of financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value or amortised cost. Moreover, all expenses incurred to achieve the earnings for the year are recognised in the Income Statement, including depreciation, amortisation, impairment losses and provisions as well as reversals due to changed accounting estimates of amounts that have previously been recognised in the Income Statement.

Assets are recognised in the Balance Sheet when it is probable that future economic benefits attributable to the asset will accrue to the Company, and the value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Liabilities are recognised in the Balance Sheet when it is probable that future economic benefits attributable to the asset will flow out of the Company, and the value of the liability can be measured reliably.

At initial recognition, assets and liabilities are measured at cost. Subsequently, assets and liabilities are measured as described for each item below.

Certain financial assets and liabilities are measured at amortised cost, which involves the recognition of a constant effective interest rate over the term. Amortised cost is calculated as original cost less repayments and with the addition/deduction of the accumulated amortisation of the difference between the cost and the nominal amount. This way, exchange losses and gains are allocated over the term.

In connection with recognition and measurement, consideration is given to predictable losses and risks occurring prior to the presentation of the Annual Report, i.e. losses and risks which prove or disprove matters which exist at the balance sheet date.

## **Accounting Policies**

#### **Income Statement**

#### Gross profit/loss

The Company has decided to aggregate certain items of the Income Statement in accordance with the provisions of Section 32 of the Danish Financial Statements Act.

Gross profit contains revenue, other operating income and other external expenses

#### Revenue

Income from delivery of services is recognised as revenue as the service is delivered.

#### Other operating income

Other operating income comprise items of a secondary nature to the principal activity of the Company.

#### Raw materials and consumables

Costs for raw materials and consumables comprise purchase of goods and services for resale.

#### Other external expenses

Other external expenses comprise expenses regarding sale and administration.

#### Other operating expenses

Other operating expenses comprises items of a secondary nature to the activities of the enterprises, including loss on sale of intangible and tangible assets.

#### Staff expenses

Staff expenses comprise wages and salaries, pensions and social security costs.

Other staff expenses are recognised in other external expenses.

#### Amortisation and impairment of tangible assets

Amortisation and impairment of tangible assets has been performed based on a continuing assessment of the useful life of the assets in the Company. Non-current assets are amortised on a straight line basis, based on cost, on the basis of the following assessment of useful life and residual values:

Profit or loss resulting from the sale of tangible assets is determined as the difference between the selling price less selling costs and the carrying amount at the date of sale, and is recognised in the Income Statement under other operating income or expenses.

## Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the Income Statement with the amounts that concern the financial year. Financial income and expenses include interest income and expenses, realised and unrealised capital gains and losses regarding debt and foreign currency transactions as well as surcharges and allowances under the tax repayment scheme.

#### Tax on net profit/loss for the year

Tax on net profit/loss for the year comprises current tax on expected taxable income of the year and the year's adjustment of deferred tax less the part of the tax of the year that relates to changes in equity. Current and deferred tax regarding changes in equity is recognised directly in equity.

## **Accounting Policies**

#### **Balance Sheet**

#### **Tangible assets**

Tangible assets are measured at cost plus revaluations, if any, and less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price and costs directly attributable to the purchase until the date when the asset is available for use.

An impairment test of tangible assets is performed in the event of indications of a decrease in value. The impairment test is performed for each individual asset and group of assets, respectively. The assets are written down to the higher of the asset's or asset group's value in use and the net selling price (recoverable amount) in the event that this one is lower than the carrying amount.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories are measured at cost on the basis of the FIFO principle or at the net realisable value if the latter is lower.

#### Receivables

Receivables are measured at amortised cost which usually corresponds to the nominal value. The value is reduced by write-downs for expected bad debts.

#### Accrued income, assets

Accrued income recognised in assets comprises prepaid costs regarding subsequent financial years.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand.

#### **Deferred tax**

Deferred tax and the associated adjustments for the year are determined according to the balance-sheet liability method as the tax base of all temporary differences between carrying amounts and the tax bases of assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets, including the tax base of tax losses allowed for carryforward, are recognised at the value at which they are expected to be used, either by elimination in tax on future earnings or by set-off against deferred tax liabilities in enterprises within the same legal entity and jurisdiction.

Deferred tax is measured on the basis of the tax rules and tax rates that will be effective under the legislation applicable at the balance sheet date when the deferred tax is expected to crystallise as current tax.

#### **Financial liabilities**

Financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost which usually corresponds to the nominal value.

#### **Current tax liabilities**

Current tax liabilities and current tax receivables are recognised in the Balance Sheet as calculated tax on the expected taxable income for the year, adjusted for tax on taxable income for previous years as well as for tax prepaid.

## Other liabilities

Other liabilities are measured at amortised cost which usually corresponds to the nominal value.

#### Accruals and deferred income, equity and liabilities

Accruals and deferred income entered as liabilities consist of payments received regarding income in the subsequent financial years.

Contingent assets and liabilities are not recognised in the Balance Sheet but appear only in the notes.
