## Independent auditor's report

To the shareholders of Globus Wine A/S

### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Globus Wine A/S for the financial year 1 January - 31 December 2021, which comprise income statement, balance sheet, statement of changes in equity, cash flow statement and notes, including accounting policies. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company at 31 December 2021 and of the results of the Company's operations as well as the cash flows for the financial year 1 January - 31 December 2021 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

### Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. Our responsibilities under those standards and requirements are further described in the "Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements" section of our report. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

### Independence

We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) and the additional ethical requirements applicable in Denmark, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code.

### Management's responsibilities for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act and for such internal control as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements unless Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

### Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial statements.

As part of an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- ▶ Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations or the override of internal control.
- ▶ Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

## Management's review

### Data ethics

### Business review

The Company's main activity is filling wine into bag-in-boxes and bottles. The wines are either sold as Globus Wine's own brands or filled on behalf of third party brand owners.

### Financial review

Revenue increased by DKK 30.5 million to DKK 726.4 million against DKK 695.9 million last year. Cash flows from operating activities were positive by DKK 16.5 million. Profit before tax increased by DKK 20.1 million to DKK 41.7 million against DKK 21.5 million last year. Profit after tax increased by 17.8 million to DKK 32.9 million from DKK 15.0 million last year. Equity of DKK 69.5million as per 31. December 2021 is DKK 25.5 million higher than last year.

The company's profit before net financials was in 2020 significantly affected by the risk of loosing a legal case in the German subsidiary by -4.7 million. This has been reversed in 2021 as the case was settled with in 2021.

Management considers the results of operation (excluding the above mentioned reversal) very satisfactory and expectations was met.

### Letter from the Board of Directors

Globus Wine made good progress during 2021, and delivered growth well above the general market, despite the effect of the continuous worldwide Covid-19 outbreak.

The Company's production facility has in 2021 been expanded with a warehouse adding almost 20.000 pallet spaces

### *Our strategy is working*

We continue to see growth in all key segments, and a strengthening of our customer relations. In terms of sourcing, we continue to add new markets, producers and knowledge, to further strengthen our leading service platform and value proposition to customers. We have had a clear benefit from the addition of two new high capacity filling lines, strengthening the pillars for cost leadership and filling capacity in the Northern European market.

In marketing, our continued strengthening of market insight and local market understanding provide a strong position to help our Retailer and Horeca customers build value with new concepts and products in the wine category.

We have invested significant effort and costs to deliver on our customer promises.

### *Going forward*

We will in 2022 continue and intensify the strategic focus on building brands and realize organic growth in the Northern European markets while expanding our filler services. We expect a significant efficiency increase in production and a return to healthy profit margin levels as we continue to serve and grow with our customers, with a joint ambition of further adding value and innovation to the wine category.

### *Statutory CSR report*

The Group works actively with social responsibility with focus om human rights, social and employee conditions, anti-corruption as well as climate- and environmental conditions. In regards to the statutory requirement of the corporate social responsibility reporting we refer to the CSR-report on <https://globuswine.dk/corporate-social-responsibility>.

Globus Wine does not consider it appropriate to develop a data ethics policy. In this context, the entity emphasizes that the company collects and processes data only to a limited extent and does not use new technologies as part of its main activity, and does not itself or through external suppliers carry out specific data analyses, evaluations or segmentations.

## Management's review

### *Special risks*

Due to the Group's activities abroad, profit, cash flows and equity are affected by the development in exchange rates for a number of currencies, primarily USD, SEK, AUD and ZAR. To a certain extent, the Group hedges currency risks by entering into forward exchange contracts and by making purchases and sales in the same currency.

### *Events after the balance sheet date*

The Company generally achieved results in January and February 2022 in line with expectations. However, Management has noted that the worldwide Covid 19 outbreak will potentially continue to affect the Company's performance and financial position by 2022 especially related to challenges in the global freight/shipping market with service reliabilities around 30% and increased leadtimes by around 100%. However, it is not possible for the Company's management at the time of reporting to quantify the effect any further, as it will depend on the duration, mutation and extent of the virus outbreak and other consequences hereby. Danish retail and Swedish wine importers constitute the majority of the Company's volume and currently appear robust with a trend of gaining from the changes in consumer behavior, while sales to the German border and to the Horeca segment could potentially continue to be effected negatively. Overall the situation continues to be manageable, based on the situation as of the date of this report.

In relation to the ongoing war in Ukraine, the Company has no customers or suppliers in Russia or Ukraine. However, reduced supply of gas and increasing energy prices which could impact the bottle prices. At the current point in time it's too early to estimate potential net effect, including to what extent potential cost increases will be passed on to customers. High share of bag-in-box sales limit net exposure to energy prices compared to most other companies in the wine segment

No other material events affecting the Group's financial position have occurred subsequent to the financial year end.

### *Outlook*

For 2022, the company expects a revenue in the range DKK 750-790 million and profit before tax of DKK 45-55 million. Positive cash flows from operating activities are expected.

### Notes to the financial statements

#### 1 Accounting policies

The annual report of Globus Wine A/S for 2021 has been prepared in accordance with the provisions in the Danish Financial Statements Act applying to large reporting class C entities.

In accordance with section 112(1) of the Danish Financial Statements Act, the Company has not prepared consolidated financial statements.

The accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those of last year.

#### Reporting currency

The financial statements are presented in Danish kroner (DKK'000).

#### Foreign currency translation

On initial recognition, transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rate at the transaction date. Foreign exchange differences arising between the exchange rates at the transaction date and the date of payment are recognised in the income statement as financial income or financial expenses.

Receivables, payables and other monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Danish kroner at the exchange rates at the balance sheet date. Realised and unrealised exchange gains and losses are recognised in the income statement as financial income/expenses.

#### Foreign group entities

Foreign subsidiaries and associates are considered separate entities. Items in such entities' income statements are translated at an average exchange rate for the month, and balance sheet items are translated at closing rates. Foreign exchange differences arising on translation of the opening equity of foreign subsidiaries to closing rates and on translation of the income statements from average exchange rates to closing rates are taken directly to equity.

Foreign exchange adjustments of balances with separate foreign subsidiaries, which are considered part of the aggregate investment in the subsidiary, are taken directly to equity, and foreign exchange gains and losses on loans and derivative financial instruments designated as hedges of foreign subsidiaries are recognised directly in equity.

#### Derivative financial instruments

On initial recognition, derivative financial instruments are recognised at cost in the balance sheet and are subsequently measured at fair value. Positive and negative fair values of derivative financial instruments are presented as separate items in the balance sheet.

Fair value adjustments of derivative financial instruments designated as and qualifying for recognition as a hedge of the fair value of a recognised asset or liability are recognised in the income statement along with changes in the fair value of the hedged asset or liability.

Fair value adjustments of derivative financial instruments designated and qualifying as a cash flow hedge are taken to equity until the hedged transaction is carried through. Where the future transaction results in recognition of an asset or a liability, the accumulated fair value adjustment is transferred from equity to the cost of the asset or liability. Where the future transaction results in income or expenses, the accumulated fair value adjustment is transferred from equity to the income statement together with the hedged item.

Fair value adjustments of derivative financial instruments that do not qualify for hedge accounting are recognised in the income statement on an ongoing basis.

### Notes to the financial statements

#### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

##### Income statement

###### Revenue

Income from the sale of goods for resale and finished goods is recognised in revenue when transfer of the most significant rewards and risks to the buyer has taken place and provided that the income can be reliably measured and payment is expected to be received.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the agreed consideration, including excise taxes excluding VAT and taxes charged on behalf of third parties. All discounts and rebates granted are recognised in revenue.

###### Other operating income and operating expenses

Other operating income and operating expenses comprise items of a secondary nature relative to the entity's core activities, including gains or losses on the sale of fixed assets.

###### Raw materials and consumables, etc.

Raw materials and consumables include expenses relating to raw materials and consumables used in generating the year's revenue.

###### Cost of sales

Cost of sales includes the cost of goods used in generating the year's revenue.

###### Other external expenses

Other external expenses include the year's expenses relating to the Company's core activities, including expenses relating to distribution, sale, advertising, administration, premises, bad debts, payments under operating leases, etc.

###### Staff costs

Staff costs include wages and salaries, including compensated absence and pensions, as well as other social security contributions, etc. made to the entity's employees. The item is net of refunds made by public authorities.

###### Amortisation/depreciation

The item comprises amortisation/depreciation of intangible assets and property, plant and equipment.

The basis of amortisation, which is calculated as cost less any residual value, is amortised on a straight line basis over the expected useful life. The expected useful lives of the assets are as follows:

Acquired intangible assets	3 years
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Depreciation is based on the residual value of the asset and is reduced by impairment losses, if any. The depreciation period and the residual value are determined at the acquisition date and are reassessed annually. Where the residual value exceeds the carrying amount of the asset, no further depreciation charges are recognised.

In the case of changes in the depreciation period or the residual value, the effect on the depreciation charges is recognised prospectively as a change in accounting estimates.

### Notes to the financial statements

#### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

The basis of depreciation, which is calculated as cost less any residual value, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the expected useful life. The expected useful lives of the assets are as follows:

Plant and machinery	10-40 years
Other fixtures and fittings, tools and equipment	3-10 years
Leasehold improvements	3-20 years

The residual value is determined at the time of acquisition and are reassessed every year. Where the residual value exceeds the carrying amount of the asset, no further depreciation charges are recognised. In case of changes in the residual value, the effect on the depreciation charges is recognised prospectively as a change in accounting estimates.

In the case of changes in the depreciation period or the residual value, the effect on the depreciation charges is recognised prospectively as a change in accounting estimates.

### Profit/loss from investments in subsidiaries

The item includes the entity's proportionate share of the profit/loss for the year in subsidiaries after elimination of intra-group income or losses and net of amortisation and impairment of goodwill and other excess values at the time of acquisition.

The proportionate share of the individual subsidiaries' profit/loss after tax after full elimination of internal gains/losses are recognised in the parent company's income statement.

### Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement at the amounts that relate to the financial reporting period. The items comprise interest income and expenses, financial expenses related to finance leases, realised and unrealised exchange gains and losses on foreign currency transactions and surcharges and allowances under the advance-payment-of-tax scheme, etc.

### Tax

Tax for the year includes current tax on the year's expected taxable income and the year's deferred tax adjustments. The portion of the tax for the year that relates to the profit/loss for the year is recognised in the income statement, whereas the portion that relates to transactions taken to equity is recognised in equity.

The Company and its Danish group entities are jointly taxed. The total Danish income tax charge is allocated between profit/loss-making Danish entities in proportion to their taxable income (full absorption).

Jointly taxed entities entitled to a tax refund are reimbursed by the management company based on the rates applicable to interest allowances, and jointly taxed entities which have paid too little tax pay a surcharge according to the rates applicable to interest surcharges to the management company.

### Balance sheet

#### Intangible assets

Other intangible assets include development projects and other acquired intangible rights, including software licences, distribution rights and development projects.

Other intangible assets are measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses.

##### Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes the acquisition price and costs directly related to the acquisition until the time at which the asset is ready for use.

As regards self-produced fixed assets, the cost includes the cost of materials and labour, etc., directly related to the production.

Leased property, plant and equipment qualifying for recognition as assets held under finance leases are treated as acquired assets.

The cost of assets held under finance leases is measured at the lower of cost according to the lease and the net present value of the lease payments, calculated by reference to the interest rate implicit in the lease.

Gains or losses are calculated as the difference between the selling price less selling costs and the carrying amount at the date of disposal. Gains and losses from the disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognised in the income statement as other operating income or other operating expenses.

##### Leases

Leases concerning fixed assets which qualify for recognition as assets held under finance leases and where the entity bears all significant risks and enjoys all significant benefits associated with the title to such assets are treated according to the same accounting policies as are other fixed assets.

On initial recognition, the cost of assets held under finance leases is measured at the lower of the fair value and the net present value of the lease payments, made up based on the interest rate implicit in the lease or, alternatively, the entity's borrowing rate.

Liabilities under finance leases are recognised in the balance sheet as a liability, and the interest element of the lease payment is recognised in the income statement.

Leases in respect of which the entity does not bear all significant risks and enjoy all significant benefits associated with the title to the assets are considered operating leases. Payments under operating leases are recognised in the income statement over the term of the lease.

##### Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are measured, using the equity method, at the Parent Company's proportionate share of such entities' equity plus goodwill on consolidation and intra-group losses and less intra-group gains and negative goodwill, if any. Investments in entities whose net asset value is negative are measured at DKK 0. The entity's proportionate share of a deficit on equity, if any, is set off against receivables from the investment in so far as the deficit is irrecoverable. Amounts in excess thereof are recognised under 'Provisions' in so far as the Parent Company has a legal or constructive obligation to cover the deficit.

On initial recognition, equity investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost, i.e. plus transaction costs. The cost is allocated in accordance with the acquisition method; see the accounting policies regarding business combinations.

Identified increases in value and goodwill, if any, compared to the underlying entity's net asset value are amortised in accordance with the accounting policies for the assets and liabilities to which they can be attributed. Negative goodwill is recognised in the income statement.

Dividend received is deducted from the carrying amount.

Equity investments in subsidiaries measured at net asset value are subject to impairment test requirements if there is any indication of impairment.

##### **Impairment of fixed assets**

The carrying amount of intangible assets, property, plant and equipment and investments in subsidiaries is assessed for impairment on an annual basis.

Impairment tests are conducted on assets or groups of assets when there is evidence of impairment. The carrying amount of impaired assets is reduced to the higher of the net selling price and the value in use (recoverable amount).

The recoverable amount is the higher of the net selling price of an asset and its value in use. The value in use is calculated as the present value of the expected net cash flows from the use of the asset or the group of assets and the expected net cash flows from the disposal of the asset or the group of assets after the end of the useful life.

Previously recognised impairment losses are reversed when the reason for recognition no longer exists. Impairment losses on goodwill are not reversed.

##### **Inventories**

Inventories are measured at cost in accordance with the FIFO method. Where the net realisable value is lower than cost, inventories are written down to this lower value. The net realisable value of inventories is calculated as the sales amount less costs of completion and expenses required to effect the sale and is determined taking into account marketability, obsolescence and development in the expected selling price.

The cost of raw materials and consumables comprises the cost of acquisition plus delivery costs.

The cost of finished goods and work in progress includes the cost of raw materials, consumables, direct labour and indirect production overheads.

Indirect production overheads include the indirect cost of material and labour as well as maintenance and depreciation of production machinery, buildings and equipment and expenses relating to plant administration and management. Borrowing costs are not recognised in the sales price.

Goods for resale are measured at cost, which comprises the cost of acquisition plus delivery costs as well as other expenses directly attributable to the acquisition.

##### **Receivables**

Receivables are measured at amortised cost.

The Company has chosen IAS 39 as interpretation for impairment of financial receivables.

An impairment loss is recognised if there is objective evidence that a receivable or a group of receivables is impaired. If there is objective evidence that an individual receivable has been impaired, an impairment loss is recognised on an individual basis.

##### **Prepayments**

Prepayments recognised under "Assets" comprise prepaid expenses regarding subsequent financial reporting years.

##### **Cash**

Cash comprise cash and short term securities which are readily convertible into cash and subject only to minor risks of changes in value.

##### Equity

###### *Reserve for net revaluation according to the equity method*

The reserve comprises net revaluations of investments in subsidiaries compared to the cost price.

###### *Hedging reserve*

The hedging reserve comprises the cumulative net change in the fair value of hedging transactions that qualify for recognition as a cash flow hedge and where the hedged transaction has not yet been realised. The reserve is dissolved when the hedged transaction is realised, if the hedged cash flows are no longer expected to be realised or if the hedging relationship is no longer effective. The reserve does not represent a limitation under company law and may therefore be negative.

###### *Proposed dividends*

Dividend proposed for the year is recognised as a liability once adopted at the annual general meeting (declaration date). Dividends expected to be distributed for the financial year are presented as a separate item under "Equity".

##### Income taxes

Current tax payables and receivables are recognised in the balance sheet as the estimated income tax charge for the year, adjusted for prior-year taxes and tax paid on account.

Provisions for deferred tax are calculated according to the liability method on all temporary differences between the carrying amount and the tax base of assets and liabilities, with the exception of temporary differences arising at the date of acquisition of assets and liabilities neither affecting the results of operations nor taxable income, as well as temporary differences relating to goodwill which is not deductible for tax purposes.

Deferred tax is measured according to the tax rules and at the tax rates applicable at the balance sheet date when the deferred tax is expected to crystallise as current tax. Deferred tax assets are recognised at the expected value of their utilisation; either as a set-off against tax on future income or as a set-off against deferred tax liabilities in the same legal tax entity. Changes in deferred tax due to changes in the tax rate are recognised in the income statement.

##### Liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised on the raising of the loan at the proceeds received net of transaction costs incurred. Interest-bearing debt is subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method. Borrowing costs, including capital losses, are recognised as financing costs in the income statement over the term of the loan.

Other liabilities are measured at net realisable value.

##### Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are measured at the net present value of the remaining lease payments including any guaranteed residual value based on the interest rate implicit in the lease.

##### Cash flow statement

The cash flow statement shows the Group's net cash flows broken down according to operating, investing and financing activities, the year's changes in cash and cash equivalents as well as the cash and cash equivalents at the beginning and the end of the year.

Cash flows from operating activities are calculated as the profit/loss for the year adjusted for non cash operating items, changes in working capital and paid corporate income tax.

Cash flows from investing activities comprise payments in connection with purchase and sale of fixed assets.

Cash flows from financing activities comprise changes in the size or composition of the Company's share capital and related expenses as well as raising of loans, repayment of interest bearing debt and payment of dividends to shareholders.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash, and short-term securities which are readily convertible into cash and which are subject only to insignificant risks of changes in value.

##### Segment information

The allocation of revenue to activities and geographical markets is disclosed where these activities and markets differ significantly in the organisation of sales of goods and services.

#### 2 Special items

Special items comprise significant income and expenses of a special nature relative to the Company for 2021. The German subsidiary, Globus Wine GmbH, became a party to a legal case in December 2019 regarding tariff classifications for cider products sourced by a third party producer and sold to border customers. The case is in 2021 settled with the German authorities and the payable amount is for the main part covered by the company's suppliers and management has therefore reversed the provision in 2021.

As disclosed in the Management's review, the profit for the year is affected by the reversal of the provision amounting to DKK 4,728 thousand that in the opinion of the Board of Directors do not form part of the operating activities.
