Independent auditor's report

To the shareholder of Explorius Education ApS

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Explorius Education ApS for the financial year 1 September 2019 – 31 August 2020 comprising income statement, balance sheet and notes, including accounting policies. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Company's assets, liabilities and financial position at 31 August 2020 and of the results of the Company's operations for the financial year 1 September 2019 – 31 August 2020 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements unless Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Management's review

Operating review

Principal activities

The Company's business consists of marketing and selling educational experiences and semesters in various countries.

Development in activities and financial position

The Company's income statement for 2019/20 shows loss of DKK -2,378,496, compared to DKK -1,494,961 in 2018/19. Equity in the Company's balance sheet at 31 August 2020 amounted to DKK -1,872,923, compared to DKK 505,575 at 31 August 2019.

The Company has been very significantly impacted by the effects of COVID-19, in various ways. Students already abroad in the spring of 2020 typically finalised their stay, thus the revenue for the year until August 2020, was mainly impacted in the last months of the financial year. However, for the fall of 2020 and following periods, a number of stays have been cancelled or postponed, and the situation is challenging due to the possibilities for students to go abroad and the consequences of COVID-19 on many educational institutions.

The Explorius group in Sweden has generally faced the same issues as Explorius Education ApS, and has in January 2021 secured an investment of SEK 70 mio., which according to the group's plans ensures that the group will have sufficient liquidity for its operations as vaccinations are now expected to normalise the market within a year.

The Danish company has received a letter of support from the parent company for the coming year, that the parent company will support the Danish company with sufficient liquidity to meet its obligations.

Based on the above, Management believes that preparing the financial statements on the going concern basis is appropriate, as it considers that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for at least one year from the date of the financial statements.

Events after the balance sheet date

On 8 February 2021, the Company received a capital contribution of DKK 2,5 mio. from its parent company.

Notes

1 Accounting policies

The annual report of Explorius Education ApS for 2019/20 has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applying to reporting class B entities under the Danish Financial Statements Act.

The accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those of last year.

Income statement

Gross profit

Pursuant to Section 32 of the Danish Financial Statements Act, the Company has decided only to disclose gross profit.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of services is recognised on a straight-line basis in the income statement as the services are provided.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the agreed consideration excluding VAT and taxes charged on behalf of third parties. All discounts granted are recognised in revenue.

Without changing in the accounting principles for recognition of revenue and expenses, the presentation of the balance sheet has been changed from 2017/18, showing assets and liabilities related to revenue and variable costs on a gross basis.

Other operating costs

Other operating costs comprise items secondary to the activities of the entity, including losses on the disposal of intangible assets and property, plant and equipment.

Other external costs

Other external costs comprise distribution costs and costs related to sales, sales campaigns, administration, office premises, operating leases, etc.

Staff costs

Staff costs comprise wages and salaries, including holiday allowance, pension and other social security costs, etc., to the Company's employees, excluding reimbursements from public authorities.

Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses comprise interest income and expense, financial costs regarding finance leases, gains and losses on securities, payables and transactions denominated in foreign currencies, amortisation of financial assets and liabilities as well as surcharges and refunds under the on-account tax scheme, etc.

Dividends from equity investments measured at cost are recognised as income in the Parent Company's income statement in the financial year when the dividends are declared.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Tax on profit/loss for the year

Tax for the year comprises current corporation tax for the year and changes in deferred tax, including changes in tax rates. The tax expense relating to the profit/loss for the year is recognised in the income statement, and the tax expense relating to amounts directly recognised in equity is recognised directly in equity.

Receivables

Receivables are measured at amortised cost.

Write-down is made for bad debt losses where there is an objective indication that a receivable or a portfolio of receivables has been impaired. If there is an objective indication that an individual receivable has been impaired, write-down is made on an individual basis.

Write-downs are calculated as the difference between the carrying amount of receivables and the present value of forecast cash flows, including the realisable value of any collateral received. The effective interest rate for the individual receivable or portfolio is used as discount rate.

Prepayments and deferred income

Prepayments comprise prepayment of costs incurred relating to subsequent financial years.

Corporation tax and deferred tax

Current tax payable and receivable is recognised in the balance sheet as tax computed on the taxable income for the year, adjusted for tax on the taxable income of prior years and for tax paid on account.

Deferred tax is measured using the balance sheet liability method on all temporary differences between the carrying amount and the tax value of assets and liabilities based on the planned use of the asset or settlement of the liability. However, deferred tax is not recognised on temporary differences related to goodwill non-deductible for tax purposes and on office premises and other items where the temporary differences arise at the date of acquisition without affecting either profit/loss or taxable income.

Deferred tax assets, including the tax value of tax loss carryforwards, are recognised at the expected value of their utilisation within the foreseeable future; either as a set-off against tax on future income or as a set-off against deferred tax liabilities in the same legal tax entity. Any deferred net assets are measured at net realisable value.

Deferred tax is measured in accordance with the tax rules and at the tax rates applicable at the balance sheet date when the deferred tax is expected to crystallise as current tax. Changes in deferred tax as a result of changes in tax rates are recognised in the income statement or equity, respectively.

Equity

Dividends

The expected dividends payment for the year is disclosed as a separate item under equity.

Liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised at cost at the date of borrowing, corresponding to the proceeds received less transaction costs paid. In subsequent periods, the financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Accordingly, the difference between cost and the nominal value is recognised in the income statement over the term of the loan together with interest expenses.

Finance lease obligations comprise the capitalised residual lease obligation of finance leases.

Other liabilities are measured at net realisable value.

Prepayments and deferred income

Deferred income comprises advance invoicing regarding income in subsequent years.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash and short-term marketable securities with a term of three months or less, which are easily convertible into cash and which are subject to only an insignificant risk of changes in value.

The Explorius group in Sweden has generally faced the same issues as Explorius Education ApS, and has in January 2021 secured an investment of SEK 70 mio., which according to the group's plans ensures that the group will have sufficient liquidity for its operations as vaccinations are now expected to normalise the market within a year.

On 8 February 2021, the Danish Company received a capital contribution from its parent company of DKK 2.5 mio.
