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### **Independent Auditor's Report**

## To the Shareholders of Cumasa VC K/S Opinion

In our opinion, the Financial Statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company at 31 December 2019 and of the results of the Company's operations for the financial year 1 January 31 December 2019 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

We have audited the Financial Statements of Cumasa VC K/S for the financial year 1 January 31 December 2019, which comprise income statement, balance sheet, statement of changes in equity and notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. Our responsibilities under those standards and requirements are further described in the "Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Statements" section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

### Statement on Management's Review

Our opinion on the Financial Statements does not cover Management's Review, and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

The Company contributes venture capital to competitive enterprises.

### Unusual matters

The company's financial position at 31 December 2019 and the results of its operations for the financial year ended 31 December 2019 are not affected by any unusual matters.

### Financial review

The company's income statement for the year ended 31 December 2019 shows a profit of EUR 448.254, and the balance sheet at 31 December 2019 shows equity of EUR 97.991.

### Significant events occurring after the end of the financial year

No events have occurred after the balance sheet date which could significantly affect the company's financial position.

### Special risks apart from generally occurring risks in industry

### Operating risks

The objective of the Company is to contribute venture capital to competitive enterprises. The most important risk factor is therefore changes in the value of the investment made in the portfolio company.

### Financial risks

The Investment made is in Finland and a negative event in the Finnish capital marketswould most likely affect the financing and/or exit possibilities in general.

### Currency risks

The Company's investment is made in a Finnish company with EUR as the operational currency. The exchange risk related to the investment is therefore regarded as being fairlysmall and only connected to the company's revenues in non-operational currency.

### Interest-rate risks

The Company is less sensitive to changes in the interest level. Cash carries current interestat fixed-term deposits.

### Credit risks

The main focus at Cumasa VC K/S in the future will be to continue to develop and support the existing investment portfolio and to drive successful exits.

### 3 Equity

Limited Partners' and General Partners' total committed capital is MEUR 13 of which MEUR 10 is not yet called at 31 December 2019.

### Accounting policies

The annual report of Cumasa VC K/S for 2019 has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Danish Financial Statements Act concerning reporting class B entities as well as selected rules applying to reporting class C.

The accounting policies applied are consistent with those of last year.

The annual report for 2019 is presented in EUR.

### Basis of recognition and measurement

Income is recognised in the income statement as earned, including value adjustments of financial assets and liabilities. All expenses, including amortisation, depreciation and impairment losses, are also recognised in the income statement.

Assets are recognised in the balance sheet when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the company and the value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Liabilities are recognised in the balance sheet when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow from the company and the value of the liability can be measured reliably.

On initial recognition, assets and liabilities are measured at cost. On subsequent recognition, assets and liabilities are measured as described below for each individual accounting item.

Certain financial assets and liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Amortised cost is calculated as the historic cost less any installments and plus/less the accumulated amortisation of the difference between the cost and the nominal amount.

On recognition and measurement, allowance is made for predictable losses and risks which occur before the annual report is presented and which confirm or invalidate matters existing at the balance sheet date.

### Income statement

### Value adjustments of investments

The value adjustment of the investment into the portfolio company comprises value adjustments realized from sale and value adjustments unrealized from any revaluation or impairment of the investment in the portfolio company at fair value. Dividends received from the investment are included in value adjustments.

### Other external expenses

Other external expenses include expenses related to administration, etc.

### **Accounting policies**

### Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement at the amounts relating to the financial year. Net financials include interest income and expenses, realised and unrealised capital/exchange gains and losses, etc.

### Tax on profit/loss for the year

The Company is not independently liable to tax and consequently tax has not been recognized.

### **Balance** sheet

### Investments in portfolio companies etc.

Investments in associates and other investments comprise investments in portfolio companies and are measured at fair value on the balance sheet date.

Investments in portfolio companies are measured according to the guidelines of the "International Private Equity and Venture Capital" (IPEV) "Valuation Guidelines" which is why investments are recognised at fair value at the balance sheet date in accordance with the Danish Financial Statement Act §37 and §41.

Investments in portfolio companies of which listed market prices exist are measured on the basis of the last market price. Unlisted portfolio companies are valued either by way of a capital increase round or part sale based on the value of companies as well as by applying traditional measurement methods.

### Fair value estimation

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as publicity traded derivatives and equity securities publicly traded on a stock exchange) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the reporting date.

Fair value for unlisted equity securities are determined by the General Partner using valuation techniques. Such valuation techniques may include earnings multiples and discounted cash flows. The Partnership adjust the valuation model as deemed necessary for factors such as non maintainable earnings, tax risk, growth stage and cash traps.

The general partner has chosen to adopt different valuation techniques depending on the portfolio company. For holdings with substantial and sustainable cash flow or earnings, the general partner has adopted a valuation technique using averages of P/E and EBITDA. For holdings without significant profits or positive cash flow, the general partner has maintained cost or the price of a recent investment or the use of multiples based on revenues. Please refer to note 2 for further details on the valuations models and applied multiples.

### **Accounting policies**

### Receivables

Receivables are measured at amortised cost.

### Liabilities

Liabilities, which include trade payables and other payables, are measured at amortised cost, which is usually equivalent to nominal value.

### Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates at the date of the transaction.

Receivables, liabilities and other items in foreign currencles which have not been settled at the balance sheet date are translated at the exchange rates at the balance sheet date.

Realised and unrealised exchange rate adjustments are included in the income statement as financial income/expenses.
