In addition, the Company's owner has not issued a letter of financial support to the Company. Based on this, there is material uncertainty over the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Company's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent on management's ability to source alternative funding.

Independent auditor's report

To the shareholder of Hamleys Denmark ApS

Adverse opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Hamleys Denmark ApS for the financial year 1 January – 31 December 2017 comprising income statement, balance sheet, statement of changes in equity and notes, including accounting policies. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter described in the Basis for adverse opinion section in our report, the accompanying financial statements do not give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2017, and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

Basis for adverse opinion

The financial statements has been prepared on a going concern basis. As described in note 2 to the financial statements, the owner has not issued a letter of financial support and the Company's ability to continue as a going concern is depending on management's ability to source alternative funding. In our opinion, without the financial support of the owner or alternative funding, the operations of the Company cannot be continued. The financial statements should have been prepared under the assumption that the operations of the Company are not continued and the values of assets and liabilities should therefore have been adjusted to net realisation values. It has not been possible to determine the impact on the financial statements hereof.

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. Our responsibilities under those standards and requirements are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these rules and requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our adverse opinion.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act and for such internal control that Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements unless Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs and the additional requirements in Denmark will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. As it is described in the Basis for adverse opinion section of our report, our opinion on the financial statements has been modified because of Management's use of the going concern assumption. We have concluded, that the Management's Review for the same reason includes material misstatements in relation to amounts and other elements, that is impacted by the use of the going concern assumption.

Operating review

Main activity

The main activity of the Company is retailing of toys in stores located in Copenhagen.

Development in the year

The income statement of the Company from 1 January – 31 December 2017 shows a loss of DKK 16,713 thousand (1 April – 31 December 2016: loss of DDKK 6,919 thousand) and at 31 December 2017 the balance sheet of the Company shows negative equity of DKK 16,281 thousand (31 December 2016: positive equity of DKK 432 thousand). The result for the year has been negatively affected by a decline in sales and an increase in costs, resulting in the Company incurring losses for the year.

Material uncertainties related to going concern

Management has taken numerous actions to reduce costs and improve the sales performance of the stores to turnaround the business, but this unfortunately has not been successful, resulting in continued significant losses. In addition, the Company's owner has not issued a letter of financial support to the Company. Based on this, there is material uncertainty over the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Company's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent on management's ability to source alternative funding.

Notes

1 Accounting policies

The annual report of Hamleys Denmark ApS for 2017 has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applying to reporting class B entities under the Danish Financial Statements Act.

The accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those of last year.

Income statement

Gross profit

With reference to section 32 of the Danish Financial Statements Act, revenue and other external costs have not been disclosed in the Annual Report.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods for resale and finished goods is recognised in the income statement when delivery and transfer of risk to the buyer have been made before year end.

Revenue is recognised exclusive of VAT and net of discounts relating to sales.

Other external costs

Other external costs comprise distribution costs and costs related to sales, sales campaigns, administration, office premises, operating leases, etc.

Expenses for consumables

Expenses for consumables comprise the consumables consumed to achieve revenue for the year.

Staff expenses

Staff expenses comprise wages and salaries as well as payroll expenses other than production wages.

Amortisation, depreciation and impairment losses

Amortisation, depreciation and impairment losses comprise depreciation and impairment of property, plant and equipment.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement at the amounts relating to the financial year.

Balance sheet

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and less any impairment losses.

Cost comprises the cost of acquisition and expenses directly related to the acquisition up until the time when the asset is ready for use. In the case of assets of own construction, cost comprises direct and indirect expenses for labour, materials, components and sub-suppliers.

Depreciation based on cost reduced by any residual value is calculated on a straight-line basis over the expected useful lives of the assets, which are:

Fixtures and fittings, tools and equipment

3 years

Leasehold improvements

3 years

The carrying amounts of property, plant and equipment are reviewed on an annual basis to determine whether there is any indication of impairment other than that expressed by depreciation.

If so, the asset is written down to its lower recoverable amount.

Deposits

Deposits include rental deposits which are recognised and measured at amortised cost. Deposits are not depreciated.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost under the FIFO method and net realisable value.

The net realisable value of inventories is calculated at the amount expected to be generated by sale in the process of normal operations.

Receivables

Receivables are recognised in the balance sheet at amortised cost, which substantially corresponds to nominal value. Provisions for estimated bad debts are made on an individual basis.

Prepayments

Prepayments comprise prepaid expenses concerning rent, insurance premiums, subscriptions and interest.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Translation policies

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates at the dates of transaction. Gains and losses arising due to differences between the transaction date rates and the rates at the dates of payment are recognised in financial income and expenses in the income statement. Where foreign exchange transactions are considered hedging of future cash flows, the value adjustments are recognised directly in equity.

Receivables, payables and other monetary items in foreign currencies that have not been settled at the balance sheet date are translated at the exchange rates at the balance sheet date. Any differences between the exchange rates at the balance sheet date and the transaction date rates are recognised in financial income and expenses in the income statement.

Fixed assets acquired in foreign currencies are measured at the transaction date rates.
