Independent auditor's report

To the Shareholders of Exowave ApS

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Exowave ApS for the financial year 1 January - 31 December 2021, which comprise a summary of significant accounting policies, income statement, balance sheet and notes, for the Company. The financial statements are prepared under the Danish Financial Statements Act.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company at 31 December 2021, and of the results of the Company's operations for the financial year 1 January - 31 December 2021 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) and the additional requirements applicable in Denmark. Our responsibilities under those standards and requirements are further described in the "Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements" section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' International Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) and the additional ethical requirements applicable in Denmark, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Management's Responsibilities for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act, and for such internal control as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements unless Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Management's review

The principal activities of the company

Exowave ApS' purpose is to hold ownership and manage the invested capital in operational activities and subsidiaries to fulfill the vision of the company: to make fresh water and clean energy available by leveraging nature's own power from the oceans.

Exowave's activity is development, production, licensing and as provider of services based on renewable energy from the oceans directed towards production of fresh water, electricity, or Hydrogen (Power-to-X).

Development in activities and financial matters

The result for the year totals DKK -1.461.905 against DKK -501.560 last year. The result for the year is expected by the management.

Project grants and project development costs by both Exowave and contract partners are booked directly as revenue and directs cost. Gross profit is shown in the company's Income Statement accordingly.

Development costs has not been booked as intangible assets, due to uncerntainty in the valuation of expected future value of the present project.

The management considers the financial capacity of the company by year-end 2021 to be sufficient and in accordance with outlook for 2022 covering both project related costs, operational costs and other financial liabilities based on present project engagements and established cost structure.

The technology development project "Exowave, Water, Electricity and PtX" has reached a financial progression by the end of 2021 of 51,6 percent of the total project budget.

Exowave has in 2021 enlarged its number of private investors from 13 to 15. Two new investors along with six earlier investors have in 2021 acquired all available treasury shares at a total sales value of DKK 2.384.000.

Background

Exowave holds the intellectual property rights to a wave energy converter (WEC) to harvest energy from the oceans and generate hydraulic mass pressure. The WEC-platform enables ocean powered solutions for different purposes such as Wave-to-Energy (electricity), Wave-to-Water (desalinated freshwater) and Power-to-X (purified water for Hydrogen production by electrolysis). The production of energy as mass pressure is totally carbon neutral and has no emissions.

The company's ongoing investments since 2014 has secured patent rights in Denmark, France, Germany, United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, China, Japan, Mexico, and USA as 100 percent owner of the subsidiary Patentselskabet af 30. november 2014 ApS. Brazil and India are pending.

In 2021, the subsidiary has filed a new patent application.

Management's review

Expected developments

The Exowave wave energy converter (WEC) is developed and demonstrated to secure performance, stability, and robust viability in live nature under demanding conditions submerged in the sea. The evolution from an idea to a fully commercialized production facility takes place through a series of development phases that will ensure progress in maturity through conceptualization, development, testing, demonstration, and documentation.

The project "Exowave, Water, Electricity and PtX" approved by EUDP (Energy Technology Development and Demonstration Program) under the Danish Ministry of Climate, Energy and Utilities in 2020, has progressed during 2021. Five Working packages has been finalized and further five are in progress by year-end, and the remaining two working packages will be performed in 2022 ending the total project in estimated October.

The project financed by 68,3 percent in grant from EUDP (Energy Technology Development and Demonstration Program) under the Danish Ministry of Climate, Energy and Utilities includes the project partners Aalborg University, MDT A/S, Much More Water ApS and DanWEC.

Associated partner Siemens Gamesa Renewable Energy S.A. and Exowave have after successful closing of the joint feasibility study within the EUDP-project signed a Letter of Intention to study potentials to join forces to develop the world's first 250 MW wave energy plant in 2026 combined with offshore wind.

The "Exowave, Water, Electricity and PtX"-project is estimated to be finalized successfully in 2022. The management considers the Technology Readiness Level, TRL, to reach the stage of 6 (Technology validated in relevant environment) after 2022. The score is within the scale from TRL level 1 (Basic principles observed) to TRL 9 (Actual system proven in operational environment).

Further projects enhancing the technology from TRL 6 to TRL 9 is planned in 2022 to 2026.

Events occurring after the end of the financial year

There have been no events after the balance sheet date, which would influence the company's financial position by the year ending 2021 in any significant way.

The annual report for Exowave ApS has been presented in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act regulations concerning reporting class B enterprises. Furthermore, the company has decided to comply with certain rules applying to reporting class C enterprises.

The accounting policies are unchanged from last year, and the annual report is presented in DKK.

Income statement

Gross profit

Gross profit comprises the external costs.

Revenue is recognised in the income statement if delivery and passing of risk to the buyer have taken place before the end of the year and if the income can be determined reliably and inflow is anticipated. Recognition of revenue is exclusive of VAT and taxes and less any discounts relating directly to sales.

Cost of sales comprises costs concerning purchase of raw materials and consumables less discounts.

Other external costs comprise costs for distribution, sales, advertisement, administration and premises.

Staff costs

Staff costs include salaries and wages, including holiday allowances, pensions, and other social security costs, etc., for staff members. Staff costs are less government reimbursements.

Research and development costs

Research and development costs comprise costs, salaries, and wages and depreciation directly or indirectly attributable to the company's research and development activities.

Research costs are recognised in the income statement in the year incurred.

Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement with the amounts concerning the financial year. Financial income and expenses comprise interest income and expenses.

Results from investments in subsidiaries

The investment in the individual subsidiaries are recognised in the income statement as a proportional share of the subsidiaries' post-tax profit or loss.

Tax on net profit or loss for the year

Tax for the year comprises the current income tax for the year and changes in deferred tax and is recognised in the income statement with the share attributable to the net profit or loss for the year and directly in equity with the share attributable to entries directly in equity.

The company is subject to Danish rules on compulsory joint taxation of Danish group enterprises. The company acts as an administration company in relation to the joint taxation. This means that the total Danish tax payable by the Danish consolidated companies is paid to the tax authorities by the company.

The current Danish income tax is allocated among the jointly taxed companies proportional to their respective taxable income (full allocation with reimbursement of tax losses).

Statement of financial position

Impairment loss relating to non-current assets

The carrying amount of both intangible and tangible fixed assets as well as equity investments in subsidiaries are subject to annual impairment tests in order to disclose any indications of impairment beyond those expressed by amortisation and depreciation respectively.

If indications of impairment are disclosed, impairment tests are carried out for each individual asset or group of assets, respectively. Writedown for impairment is done to the recoverable amount if this value is lower than the carrying amount.

The recoverable amount is the higher value of value in use and selling price less expected selling cost. The value in use is calculated as the present value of the expected net cash flows from the use of the asset or the asset group and expected net cash flows from the sale of the asset or the asset group after the end of their useful life.

Previously recognised impairment losses are reversed when conditions for impairment no longer exist. Impairment relating to goodwill is not reversed.

Investments

Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are recognised and measured by applying the equity method. The equity method is used as a method of consolidation.

Investments in subsidiaries are recognised in the statement of financial position at the proportionate share of the enterprise's equity value. This value is calculated in accordance with the parent's accounting policies with deductions or additions of unrealised intercompany gains and losses as well as with additions or deductions of the remaining value of positive or negative goodwill calculated in accordance with the acquisition method. Negative goodwill is recognised in the income statement at the time of acquisition of the equity investment. If the negative goodwill relates to contingent liabilities acquired, negative goodwill is not recognised until the contingent liabilities have been settled or lapsed.

Investments in subsidiaries with a negative equity value are measured at DKK 0, and any accounts receivable from these enterprises are written down to the extent that the account receivable is uncollectible. To the extent that the parent has a legal or constructive obligation to cover an negative balance that exceeds the account receivable, the remaining amount is recognised under provisions.

To the extent the equity exceeds the cost, the net revaluation of equity investments in subsidiaries transferred to the reserve under equity for net revaluation according to the equity method. Dividends from subsidiaries expected to be adopted before the approval of this annual report are not subject to a limitation of the revaluation reserve. The reserve is adjusted by other equity movements in subsidiaries.

Deposits

Deposits are measured at amortised cost and represent lease deposits, etc.

Receivables

Receivables are measured at amortised cost, which usually corresponds to nominal value.

Accounts receivable for which there is no objective indication of impairment at the individual level are evaluated at portfolio level for objective indication of impairment. The portfolios are primarily based on the debtors' domicile and credit rating in accordance with the company's and the group's credit risk management policy. Determination of the objective indicators applied for portfolios are based on experience with historical losses.

Impairment losses are calculated as the difference between the carrying amount of accounts receivable and the present value of the expected cash flows, including the realisable value of any securities received. The effective interest rate for the individual account receivable or portfolio is used as the discount rate.

Prepayments

Prepayments recognised under assets comprise incurred costs concerning the following financial year.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand.

Provisions

Provisions comprise expected costs of warranty commitments, loss on work in progress, restructuring, etc. Provisions are recognised when the company has a legal or actual commitment resulting from a previously occurred event and when it is probable that the settlement of the liability will result in consumption of the financial resources of the company.

Provisions are measured at net realisable value or at fair value. If the fulfilment of a liability is expected to take place far in the future, the liability is measured at fair value.

On the acquisition of entities, provisions for restructuring within the acquired entity are included in the acquisition cost, and thereby in the goodwill or the consolidated goodwill, to the extent that they have been recognised in the financial statements of the acquired entity in advance of the acquisition. Provisions for restructuring are included to the extent that they have been decided at the date of acquisition at the latest and that the process have been commenced.

When it is likely that the total costs will exceed the total income of contract work in progress, the total expected loss on the contract work in progress will be recognised as provisions for liabilities. The provision is recognised under production costs.

Liabilities other than provisions

Other liabilities concerning payables to suppliers, group enterprises, and other payables are measured at amortised cost which usually corresponds to the nominal value.
