Independent auditor's report

Opinion

In our opinion, the Financial Statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company at 31 December 2022, and of the results of the Company's operations for the financial year 1 October 2021 – 31 December 2022 in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act.

Management's review

Operating review

Principal activities

The Company's principal activities are the development and delivery of software and services for the oil and gas industry, including but not limited to software, software as a service (SaaS), software integration service, procedural and technical support, service technicians, implementation services and all other supplementary services associated with the operation of drilling rigs.

On 30 September 2022, Noble Corporation plc became the ultimate parent of the Maersk Drilling Group and its subsidiaries.

Uncertainty regarding recognition and measurement

When preparing the annual report, Management undertakes a number of accounting estimates and judgements to recognise, measure and classify the assets and liabilities. The only significant accounting estimate and judgement relates to the assessment of impairment of property, plant and equipment.

Management assesses impairment indicators for intangible assests and development projects and determines the recoverable amount generally consistent with the assumptions described in note 3 to the financial statements, to which reference is made.

Following the revised assumptions to the fair value for the development projects RigBridge and RigFlow, Management has recognised a net impairment loss of USD 8,715 thousand.

Development in activities and financial position

The Company was established 1 October 2021 and this annual report covers the first 15 months of the Company's activity. In this period the Company has evolved and matured software products offerings for RigBridge and RigFlow, grown and scaling the Company's products with deployments on +10 drilling rigs globally with different customers.

The Company's income statement for the period 1 October 2021 - 31 December 2022 shows a loss of USD 7,116 thousand. Equity in the Company's balance sheet at 31 December 2022 stood at a negative of USD 2,054 thousand.

The result for the year before tax and before impairment shows a loss of USD 309 thousands, which in line with management expectations.

Capital resources

The Company has lost more than 50% of its contributed capital as of 31 December 2022 and is thereby covered by the rules on capital loss laid down in the Danish Companies Act. Action plans have therefore been prepared to ensure the re-establishment of the Company's capital base.

The Parent Company has issued a letter of support stating its intention to provide necessary liquidity to ensure the Company's continued operations. Accordingly, the financial statements are presented on a going concern basis.

Notes

1 Accounting policies

The annual report of Horizon56 A/S for 2021/22 has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applying to reporting class B entities under the Danish Financial Statements Act with opt-in from higher reporting classes.

There are no comparative figures as this is the Company's first financial year.

Foreign currency translation

On initial recognition, transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates at the transaction date. Foreign exchange differences arising between the exchange rates at the transaction date and the date of payment are recognised in the income statement as financial income or financial expenses.

Receivables, payables and other monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates at the balance sheet date. The difference between the exchange rates at the balance sheet date and the date at which the receivable or payable arose or was recognised in the latest financial statements is recognised in the income statement as financial income or financial expenses.

Fixed assets acquired in foreign currencies are measured at the exchange rates at the transaction day.

USD is used as functional currency and as presentation currency because the majority of transactions are in USD. At 31 December 2022, the DKK/USD exchange rate was 695.7.

Income statement

Gross profit

Pursuant to section 32 of the Danish Financial Statements Act, the Company has decided only to disclose gross profit.

Revenue

Income from the sale of services, is recognised in revenue when delivery and transfer of risk to the buyer have taken place, and the income may be measured reliably and is expected to be received. The date of transfer of the most significant benefits and risks is determined using standard Incoterms ®2020.

Other external costs

Other external costs comprise distribution costs and costs related to sales, sales campaigns, administration, allocated personal costs and office premises.

Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement at the amounts relating to the financial year.

Tax on loss for the year

Tax for the year comprises current corporation tax for the year and changes in deferred tax, including changes in tax rates. The tax expense relating to the profit/loss for the year is recognised in the income statement, and the tax expense relating to amounts directly recognised in equity is recognised directly in equity. For the period 1 October 2021 - 3 October 2022, the Company was part of A.P. Møller Holding A/S' joint taxation, and for the period 4 October - 31 December 2022, the Company was jointly taxed with The Drilling Company of 1972 A/S. Current Danish income tax is allocated among the jointly taxed companies in proportion to their taxable income (full allocation with refund for tax losses).

Intangible assets

Development projects

Development costs comprise costs, wages, salaries and amortisation directly and indirectly attributable to development activities.

Development projects that are clearly defined and identifiable, where the technical feasibility, sufficient resources and a potential future market or development opportunities are evidenced, and where the Company intends to produce, market or use the project, are recognised as intangible assets provided that the cost can be measured reliably and that there is sufficient assurance that future earnings can cover production costs, selling costs and administrative expenses as well development costs. Other development costs are recognised in the income statement as incurred.

Development costs recognised in the balance sheet are measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses.

Upon completion of development work, development costs are amortised on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives. The amortisation period is usually 3 years.

Impairment of fixed assets

The carrying amount of intangible assets and property, plant and equipment as well as equity investments in group entities and associates is subject to an annual test for indications of impairment other than the decrease in value reflected by depreciation or amortisation.

Impairment tests are conducted of individual assets or groups of assets when there is an indication that they may be impaired. Write-down is made to the recoverable amount if this is lower than the carrying amount.

Receivables

Receivables are measured in the balance sheet at the lower of amortised cost and net realisable value, which corresponds to nominal value less write-down for bad debts. Write-down for bad debts is determined on the basis of an individual assessment of each receivable.

Corporation tax and deferred tax

Current tax payable and receivable is recognised in the balance sheet as tax computed on the taxable income for the year, adjusted for tax on the taxable income of prior years and for tax paid on account.

Deferred tax is measured using the balance sheet liability method on all temporary differences between the carrying amount and the tax value of assets and liabilities based on the planned use of the asset or settlement of the liability. However, deferred tax is not recognised on temporary differences relating to goodwill non-deductible for tax purposes and on office premises and other items where the temporary differences arise at the date of acquisition without affecting either profit/loss or taxable income.

Deferred tax assets, including the tax value of tax loss carryforwards, are recognised at the expected value of their utilisation within the foreseeable future; either as a set-off against tax on future income or as a set-off against deferred tax liabilities in the same legal tax entity. Any deferred net assets are measured at net realisable value.

Deferred tax is measured in accordance with the tax rules and at the tax rates applicable at the balance sheet date when the deferred tax is expected to crystallise as current tax. Changes in deferred tax as a result of changes in tax rates are recognised in the income statement or equity, respectively.

Liabilities other than provisions

Other liabilities are measured at amortised cost, which essentially corresponds to nominal value.

2 Going concern

The Company has lost more than 50% of its contributed capital as of 31 December 2022 and is thereby covered by the rules on capital loss laid down in the Danish Companies Act. Action plans have therefore been prepared to ensure the re-establishment of the Company's capital base.

The Parent Company has issued a letter of support stating its intention to provide necessary liquidity to ensure the Company's continued operations. Accordingly, the financial statements are presented on a going concern basis.

3 Disclosure of material uncertainties regarding recognition and measurement

On September 30, 2022, Noble Corporation plc became the ultimate parent of the Maersk Drilling Group and its subsidiaries.

In 2022, the business combination for the Group has been accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting under IFRS 3, Business Combinations. Under the acquisition method of accounting, the assets and liabilities of Maersk Drilling and its subsidiaries were reassessed and recorded at their respective fair values on the Closing Date October 3, 2023.

3 Disclosure of material uncertainties regarding recognition and measurement (continued)

The valuation of the developed technology was determined using relief-from-royalty method of income approach. Assumptions used in the assessment included, but were not limited to, future marketability in light of the current market conditions, royalty rate, discount rate, tax rate and estimated economic useful lives of the assets. The present value of the free cash flows associated with the developed technology is discounted based on a five-year period.

In the annual report ended 31 December 2022, the business combination and reassessment of asset values are considered an impairment indicator for the company, as there are changes in the assumptions used to determine the asset value. As such indication and changes in assumptions exists, Management has adjusted the assets value to the new recoverable amounts.

The assessment of indications of impairment of intangible assets and development projects is based on the expectations for future profitability, etc applicable as of 31 December 2022, which may be different from the expectations for future profitability, etc applicable as of the approval of this annual report. As a result, the Company may face adjustments to the recognized impairment of intangible assets and development projects in future reporting periods.

4 Disclosure of unusual circumstances

Following the revised assumptions to the fair value for the development projects RigBridge and RigFlow as described in Note 3, Management has recognised a net impairment loss of USD 8,715 thousand, which is included in the financial statements line item for Amortisation and impairment losses.
